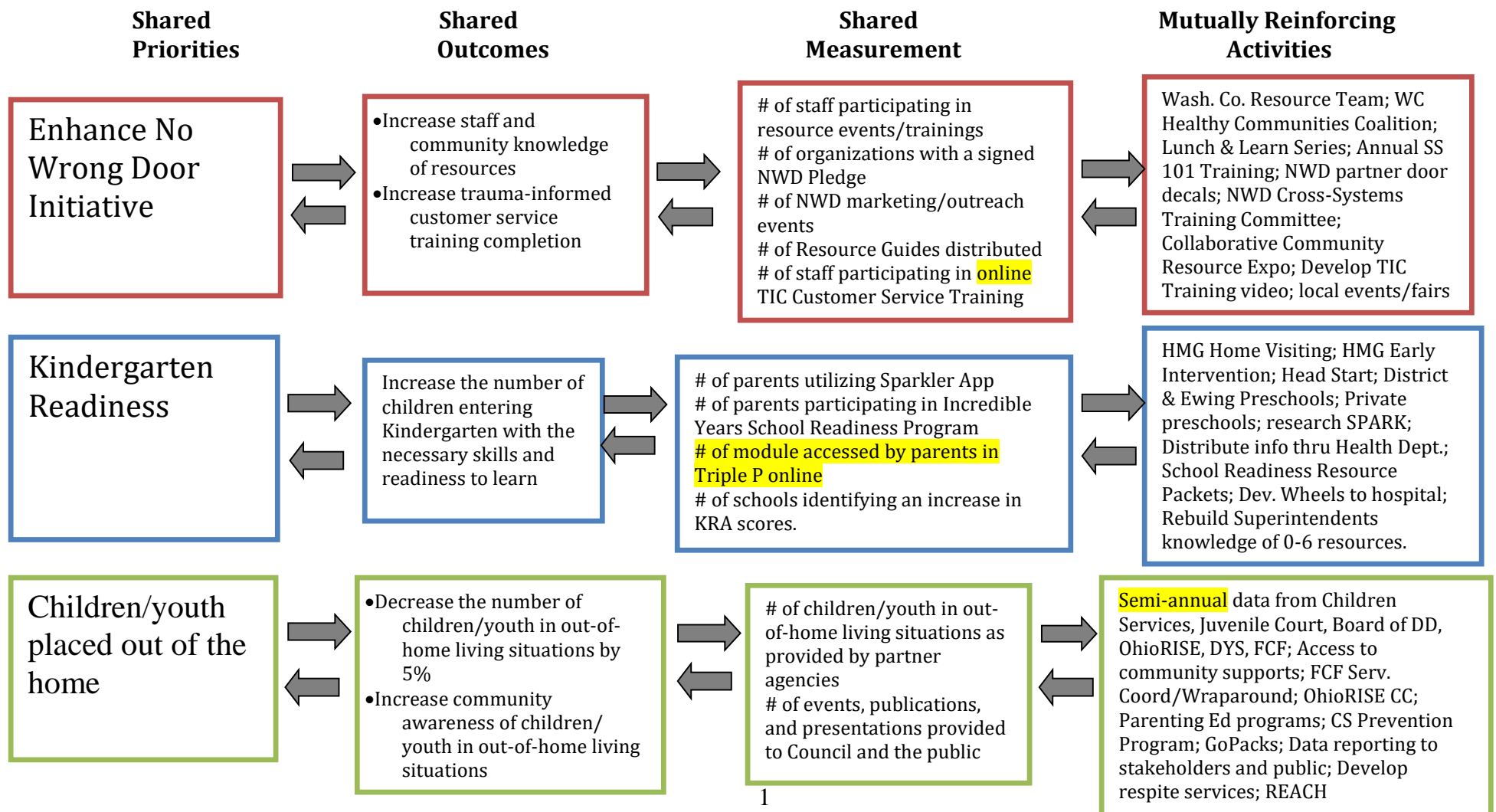

During the Council Retreat, members reviewed the data in small groups to discuss and identify concerns. Members also reviewed priorities that were identified at the Kids Summit; the ODCY Big Goals; the OFCF Shared Plan Incentive Funding Priorities; and reviewed the current Shared Plan. Members then identified any other priorities to add to the lists. From the lists, members used 'dots' to identify their priority. A Shared Plan Workgroup was formed and met 3 times to continue developing the Shared Plan Priorities, Outcomes, and Measurements around Enhancing No Wrong Door and Kindergarten Readiness, the chosen Priorities. After the Retreat, the Pooled Funds Group met and discussed capturing the number of children/youth who are placed out of the home in our county. It was suggested that this could become a third priority in our Shared Plan. This was shared with the FCF Council who strongly agreed that this data collection would be valuable information to stakeholders and the public, and approved to add it to the Shared Plan.

3. Identify any barriers experienced in this process (i.e. plan collection, availability of data, language issues, etc.):

There were no real barriers identified in this process, although we would have preferred more Council members participating in the process. We also only had access to the CHA as a community plan.

4. Identify any successes/how this process has worked to strengthen the council and county collaboration:

Council members, along with invited guests, were actively engaged in the Council Retreat process held in March 2025. Schools systems have become more actively engaged due to this process, which has brought new partners to the table. There is enhanced collaboration among partners and stakeholders with buy-in to addressing the priorities. The Shared Plan Workgroup convened several times to more fully develop the plan and had great participation and focus. The No Wrong Door Cross-Systems Training Committee also provided input on the plan. This full process has truly strengthened partnerships in our county, re-kindled relationships, and been a collaborative effort.
