

How did it all begin?

- Morrill Act of 1862 created the land grant university system.
- Morrill Act of 1890 created funds to start 17 black land grant colleges.
- The Hatch Act of 1887 provided funding to states for an agricultural experiment station.
- Smith-Lever Act of 1914 created and provided **cooperative** funding for Agricultural Extension in each state.
- 1994 Land Grants for 29 tribal colleges.
